The Goodness of the Lord?

As psalmists, we take the words of the psalm and offer them as a prayer to our Lord for the community. We sing the words from our heart for the entire assembled faithful and allow them to have their voice in the response. But keeping that prayer in our lives as we encounter the ups and downs of our journey can be more challenging.

"For ever I will sing the goodness of the Lord." (Psalm 89) This is one of my favorite psalms. I even sang a bilingual setting of it during adjudication for my Basic Cantor Certificate. It is a psalm of gratitude and calls us to "rejoice all the day." Yet when we encounter difficulties in our personal lives or when the world around us is thrown into chaos, do we continue to speak and sing words of rejoicing to our Lord? (*Continue Reading*)

The **Feast of the Baptism of the Lord** is celebrated on Monday, January 9. When this Feast occurs on Monday of the First Week in Ordinary Time, the readings assigned to Monday may be joined to those of Tuesday so that the opening of each book will be read."

Making the Gloria ... Glorious



If your assembly still requires leadership at the microphone while learning a new setting, clear and expressive diction by the cantor and dynamic contrast by both singer and instrumentalist are of the utmost importance to proclaim this hymn with joy and life. 
